Anhydrous Ammonia Certified Grower Training

All growers or grower farm operators who transport or apply anhydrous ammonia, or otherwise maintain anhydrous ammonia equipment, shall be certified to understand:

- NH3 properties and characteristics
- First aid procedures, Safety & PPE
- Emergency response
- Nurse tank safety
- Transportation safety
- Application and Transfer
- Maintenance and Inspection

Training applies to those individuals who transport or handle anhydrous ammonia:

- Farmers/Growers
- Farm Employees
- Family members
- Others that help


Certified grower training must be offered at <u>no cost</u> to the grower or grower farm operator via an in-person or online training program approved by the Illinois Department of Agriculture (IDOA).

Growers and grower farm operators have until <u>April 1, 2022</u> to be initially certified, and must participate in refresher training every three years.

8 IL Administrative Code Part 215.20 Safety

Section 215.20 Safety

d) All growers or grower farm operators who transport or apply anhydrous ammonia, or otherwise maintain anhydrous ammonia equipment, shall be certified to understand the properties of ammonia, to become competent in safe operating practices, and to take appropriate actions in the event of a leak or an emergency. Initial certification shall be achieved no later than April 1, 2022.

Section 215.15 Definitions

"Grower" means any individual who produces an agricultural commodity on property he or she owns or controls.

<u>"Grower farm operator"</u> means an individual employed by or otherwise authorized by a grower to transport or apply anhydrous ammonia, or to otherwise maintain anhydrous ammonia equipment. These individuals include grower family members, full- and part-time hired help, and others providing anhydrous ammonia services at no fee.

Frequently Asked Questions

Where will the in-person training take place?

In-person will take place at various locations throughout the state sponsored by various ag groups, including ag retailers who offer ammonia. Visit www.ifca.com/Training for a complete list of in-person training locations.

As an ag retailer, can I train my own customers?

Yes. When state Covid restrictions allow, qualified ag retailers may provide training to growers.

How do I become a certified trainer?

IFCA will schedule and communicate the dates and locations for the Train-the-Trainer sessions, as soon as Covid restrictions allow us to do so. Please contact John Rebholz (john@ifca.com) to have your name added to the list for updates about training sessions.

What are the qualifications to become a trainer?

- Minimum 5 years experience in the anhydrous ammonia industry; practical experience with storage, application and equipment operation, inspection and maintenance;
- Comfort speaking in groups and ability to relate to growers and answer their questions;
- Experience using a computer, projector and microphone and access to suitable meeting rooms or outside venues to conduct training, including venues that can accommodate COVID-19 guidelines for in person events;
- Good organization and communication skills and ability to maintain and transmit training rosters to IDA;
- You must become a Certified Competent Attendant and commit to attend this IDA-sponsored training annually.

All materials required to give the presentation will be provided to trainers, who must offer the class to growers at **no cost** to the grower.

How will I know if a grower or grower farm operator has gone through the on-line or in-person training?

IDOA will provide the grower/grower farm operators with a certificate if they successfully complete the on-line or in-person training. **Note:** Certification shall be for a period of 3 years and refresher training shall be at least every 3 years. Documentation of completed training shall be maintained by the grower or grower farm operator.

My grower/farm operator lost their training certificate, how can I verify they went through the training?

You can contact the Illinois Department of Agriculture Bureau of Ag Products Inspection 217-782-3817. IDOA will maintain a database of certified growers. If you wish to check the certification status of your grower customers, you may contact IDA at the same phone number.
